Annotating the Text

When doing research, it is important to underline or highlight and to take notes, so that you can consider and record the research that you have found. Annotating is also a skill that is required in college and the world of work. You will be turning in your research annotated for a test grade. Here is a summary of the grading.

- _____ Has three+ valid sources (not blogs, wiki, etc.) (10 pts.)
- _____ Highlighted, Annotated Articles (20 pts.)
- _____ Research fully defines the focus topic or issue (5pts.)
- _____ Includes stories and examples that explain... (5pts.)
- _____ Includes background, subtopics that branch out (5pts.)
- _____ Citation information is recorded / printed (5 pts.)

Instructions for Annotating: Have your articles stapled and organized. *Materials:* two different colored highlighters and a pencil...

→ separate / your Name on each...

Highlight: Highlight *key words, only*. Resist the temptation to block highlight or to highlight huge sections. This doesn't help to make the key words stand out. Try to highlight info you will definitely use in one color and info. that you have questions about- or may use- in a 2nd color. You may want to highlight a whole line only if it's a key quote you plan to use.

Side Notes

Margin Notes: Summarize key ideas from a passage in your own words with margin notes. Do this in **pen** or **pencil**. Obviously, using a pencil can give you more freedom to make changes. Focus your notes around key words, questions you have, and the basic topic questions of *who, what, when, where, why, and how?*

**** Be sure that each article also includes the Works Cited info.** This will be key when you begin to write a rough draft.

Meanings?</p>	<p>The 14th Dalai Lama, Tenzin Gyatso, the spiritual and temporal leader of the Tibetan people, is respected worldwide for his message of compassion and tolerance, his promotion of human values, and of inter-religious understanding, and his focus on peace through non-violent conflict resolution, including the issue of Tibet.</p>	<p>Who? What? Why?</p>
<p>What is a manifestation? Why only 2?</p>	<p>He was born on July 6, 1935 in the village of Taktser in the Tibetan area of Amdo (now Qinghai province) and, in accordance with Tibetan tradition, was recognized at the age of two as the reincarnation of his predecessor the 13th Dalai Lama. Tibetan Buddhists believe that the Dalai Lamas are the manifestations of the Bodhisattva of Compassion, Chenresig, who choose to reincarnate to serve the people. Dalai Lama is a combination of Tibetan and Mongolian terms, meaning Ocean of Wisdom. Tibetans normally refer to His Holiness as Yeshin Norbu (the Wish-fulfilling Gem) or simply, Kundun, meaning "The Presence".</p>	<p>When? Where? When? What?</p>
<p>What kinds of Studies are these?</p>	<p>The Dalai Lama began his education at age 6 and completed the Geshe Lharampa Degree (equivalent to a Doctorate of Buddhist Philosophy) when he was 25. At age 24, he took the preliminary examination at each of the three monastic universities around Lhasa: Drepung, Sera and Ganden. The final examination was held in the Jokhang Temple during the annual Monlam, the Festival of Prayer, held in the first Tibetan month of every year. He was examined on logic, the Middle Path, the canon of monastic discipline and the study of metaphysics. He passed the exams with honors, conducted before a vast audience of monk scholars.</p> <p>How can a leader be so young? What is Buddhism? Who still believes in reincarnation?</p>	<p>When? What?
